In 2018, U.S. health care costs were \$3.6 trillion. That makes health care one of the country's largest industries. It equals 17.7% of gross domestic product. In comparison, health care cost \$27.2 billion in 1960, just 5% of GDP. That translates to an annual health care cost of \$11,172 per person in 2018 versus just \$147 per person in 1960.
